PRESENTATION

In Canada, more than 20% of the population is composed of immigrants, and this proportion continues to grow. In the current context of globalization and new migratory trends, the integration of immigrants into the host society and into the labor market raises important issues. In a recent report, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) encourages developed countries to resort to immigrant workers to counter the potential economic slowdowns stemming from the aging of the population.

New datasets help to deepen our understanding of the impacts of immigration and the mechanisms leading to successful integration. This new data also makes it possible to examine more specific questions such as the links between immigration and demographic changes or the impact of immigration on firms' productivity.



The Quebec Inter-University Centre for Social Statistics (QISCC) was established in 2001 with the specific aim of promoting research within the field of social statistics in Quebec. It brings together all of Quebec universities (Université de Montréal, Concordia University, Université Laval, McGill University, Université du Québec à Montréal, Institut national de recherche scientifique, Université de Sherbrooke and Réseau de l'Université du Québec) in a unique partnership with Statistics Canada and the Institut de la statistique du Québec. As such, the QICSS is the sole Quebec member of the Canadian Research Data Centre Network. Central to its operation is the existence of six secure computer laboratories in university settings, where researchers can have access to micro-data from the statistical agencies in the strict respect of confidentiality rules. The QICSS pursues three main objectives: support and develop cutting-edge research; expand the pool of researchers and provide training to the next generation; disseminate research findings and their implication to a wider audience.

The Productivity Partnership aims to engage researchers interested in studying Canada's productivity challenge. The project is funded by a Partnership Development Grant awarded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, and numerous public and private partners. The objective of the Partnership is to enhance existing knowledge and add to existing research capacity by bringing together researchers from academia and the public and private sectors, by funding their research on productivity issues and assisting with the development of new data that can shed new light on these issues.


